TS 5506 – Graphics and Multimedia – Discussions

The course introduces graphics and multimedia technologies, as learners create a Web interactive animation project. Activities include illustrating with Flash, using animation techniques and special effects. Flash files produce resizable compact full-screen navigation interfaces, technical illustrations, long-form animations, and other dazzling site effects. Flash enables Web designers to import artwork from their favorite bitmap or illustration programs, apply transparency, create morphing effects, add interactivity and sound, and animate them over time. Unlike bitmapped images that are optimized for a single resolution, vector images can adapt to multiple display sizes and resolutions. This is ideal for displaying Web sites uniformly on set-top boxes, handheld computers, or PCs. This course will also cover how to embed exported Flash movies into HTML documents for play in a browser. Learners are required to take TS7010 prior to taking this course.

Welcome to your Capella University online course, TS5506 - Graphics and Multimedia. This course will cover the basic functionality of Web animation and interactivity. You will learn to illustrate with Flash MX using animation techniques and special effects. Flash files produce resizable compact full-screen navigation interfaces, technical illustrations, animations, and dazzling site effects. U1D2 File Types

Write a paragraph on your understanding of the difference between vector and bitmap files.

Vector files are comprised of mathematical vector points which mathematically describe an object's outline so that the objects are represented in flat and layered shapes similar to paper cutouts. The file size is much less than with bitmap files so that they can be down loaded much faster. The image can be increased or decreased in size with no loss of image quality so that the image remains sharp and crisp. This system is used with Flash, Illustrator, FreeHand, among others. Bitmap files are composed of pixelated microscopic squares that are listed in files that describe their color, value, size, number, location, etc. and therefore require much more storage space. When these images are enlarged the outlines become approximated and can become blurry. This system is used when photographs are scanned and used in FireWorks and Photoshop and other photographic enhancement programs. A comparison between vector and bitmap technology could be made using a metaphor of offset printing with vector as comparable to line art and bitmap pixels as comparable to screened half tones where the microscopic dots of the half tone can create effects of value, color, and shades of light and dark.

Write a paragraph on how a Flash file differs from an HTML file. Provide an analysis of the differences between a .fla file and a .swf file.

HTML, or HyperText Markup Language, is based on text code and is more generally accessible on all computers. Flash is digitally and vector based and connects to plug ins and can be placed within an HTML document. An .fla (for Flash) file is the source document and is the editable root file. The .exe (a stand alone program file) and .swf (for Small Web File) files can be generated from the .fla files. A .swf file can be placed within an HTML file (which functions as a container to hold the .swf file) and put onto the Internet and is generally neither editable nor edible.

from Jon: Getting the point across that the primary content of HTML is text is a difficult one. I'm currently teaching an introductory class in HTML, and I spent quite a while convincing students that just because a web page displays a graphic doesn't mean the image is "in" that file. An HTML file is exactly what its name implies, marked up hypertext. It is the browser that makes the images appear according to the instructions handed to it from the HTML file. I was a little surprised how difficult that was to explain to students.

and: .swf files sure are optimized. I'm currently working on a project to import some video into Flash for delivery on the web. I'm not into video editing and compression yet, but after being given video files that are already compressed, Flash did quite a number on compressing it even further. So much so that our video was basically unusable for the project. We're now attempting to work with the raw video footage (after editing) to see how much Flash will compress the video. What was supposed to take a couple of hours just importing things has now taken a week of tweaking the video import settings.

Take note of the tip on transparent gradient colors. You may find this useful in your animations. As you explore all the functions of the gradient tool, you will get ideas for your projects.

NOTE: When you finish a Flash lesson and close the document to go on to the next one, be sure not to save it when the dialog box comes up, unless you give the lesson a different name. You will want to keep the original lesson intact in case you want to refer to it again.

If you are familiar with other drawing programs, such as Photoshop, or vector programs such as Freehand or Illustrator, you will already be familiar with most of these tools. However, there are some additions and differences within Flash, so it will serve you well to learn the tools specific to Flash MX 2004.

Keep in mind that when you are creating Flash movies, you can always return to these lessons, unlock the layers, and see exactly how the file was created. You can look at all the images contained in the library, the timeline, and the scripts, and see how the experts did it.

If you have not done so already, look up "Preferences" in the index of the Flash MX 2004 Help online documentation. You can set preferences for:

Clipboard. Disable timeline docking. Editing, drawing wettings. Editing, pen tool options. Editing, pen tool options. Editing, show pen preview option. Editing, show precise cursors option. The first frame of the timeline in the Actions panel is set with Global Functions>Timeline Control>Stop so it seems that the sound would not start playing automatically.

Thank you for your reply. I tried that technique in PhotoShop and, after using the lasso and deleting the background, I imported the image into Flash (it worked with copy and paste or with File>Import in Flash) but the "paper doll" figure is within a rectangle but with a blank white background. I guess one way of doing that idea, so that there is a shape on the stage, is to draw an outline of the shape and then do a fill with the imported bitmap image but I don't know how (or if) that can be done.
